TRANSMISSION NEWS

REUSED IV-LINE NEEDLES

Dr. Stephen Stein, a dentist in Denver, is accused of risky practices and prescription fraud. It is thought that one of his employees told on him. He is accused of re-using needles used to inject medicine through IV lines, putting thousands of his patients at risk for blood-borne diseases between 1999 and 2011. Any of his patients who received IV meds should be tested. The health department mailed 8000 letters but records are incomplete. Did you ever think you could be infected by a dentist or oral surgeon? What could his patients have done to prevent this? This is a good reason to get EVERYONE tested.

HOSPITAL: 31 INFECTED

So far, 30 patients and one employee from the Exeter Hospital, New Hampshire, tested positive for a Hep C genotype linked to a heart catheterization lab or recovery section. 50 patients still need to be tested. Some haven't been found. Some refused testing. 12 more tested positive, but for a different genotype. (Universal Testing, please!) So far, those who tested HCV+ were treated between June 2011 and May 2012. It was thought that an employee was self-injecting drugs meant for patients, possibly in the middle of procedures, and reusing the syringes on patients.

Breaking News: David Kwiatkowski, 33, a travelling technician--called a "serial infector"--was arrested July 19 at a Massachusetts hospital, where he is being treated. He was employed at Exeter Hospital, and has worked in at least 6 states.

CALGARY: PIERCING STORE OWNERS FINED

Rashmi and Naresh Bhalla, owners of

Avon Apna Jewellers and Apna Jewellers, were fined \$8,625 for seven charges of illegal body piercing. One woman contracted Hep B after her nose was pierced there, however it couldn't be proven that she was infected by those jewellers. The owners admitted that hands, equipment and customers' skin weren't sterilized correctly.

TATTOO ARTIST TATTLED ON

Shannyn Moss of Guelph complains of slander. Public Health sent out a letter to her clients telling them to be tested for blood-borne diseases. They said she had an unlicensed, uninspected business at her home for years, and couldn't produce consent forms for her underage clients. Moss says her only clients have been family and friends, and admitted to using expired needles. The authorities suspect she was advertising by word of mouth.

To her credit, she called about licensing and asked for an inspection. The warning letter stated that expired, pre-sterilized equipment may have been used.

Want a tattoo? Ask to see the public health report and check sterilization procedures.

York Region HepC Education **Group - An Update**

We are writing to inform you of the changes that have occurred at the York Region Community and Health Services Department related to the Hepatitis C Education Group.

During the period of 1997-1998, the need for the Hepatitis C Education Group was identified by the residents of York Region, and to meet this need, a partnership was formed between the York Region Public Health Department and a group of York Region community residents infected and affected by hepatitis C. The group has been meeting for 13 years through the success of the partnership and the shared responsibilities for decision making amongst the steering committee members.

In early 2011, the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) discontinued funding for the hepatitis C group due to restructuring of their funding to Blood Borne Infections programs. The Hepatitis C Education Group has also seen a decline in attendance over the last couple of years, with the last meeting being held in November 2011. Due to the decrease in attendance and the lack of funding from PHAC, it has been decided to dissolve the Hepatitis C Education Group as of today.

York Region Public Health would like to thank the members of the Hepatitis C Education Group who were willing to share their stories, experiences and ideas which made the group a success. It has been such a pleasure to work in partnership with the York Region community. We would also like to extend our gratitude to the Public Health Agency of Canada for the funding and support they have provided over the years and to all of the Health Care Professionals who have been involved in supporting the group including guest speakers and Public Health Nurses.

A FRIEND WITH HEP C

has Hep C. "How did you get it?" we ask wonderingly and concerned, and not knowsimple and complex, is always sad. Often people don't know how they got HepC, or are ashamed to think about stupid ways they could have gotten it when they were young. But often it was transmitted during lifesaving medical treatments. Untested blood was not considered to be dangerous back in the 1970's. We thought donating blood was humanitarian because it saved lives of precious people. "Give Blood." What we weren't told is where the blood came from. It out a little late, that sometimes it came from people untested and sick, whose blood was often mixed together into a potentially toxic

A silent, invisible, unknown, swift life change: 20 years go by; 30 years go by; nothing unusual to trigger any suspicion. No blood tests for Hep C are given routinelyeven to this day —so the virus is left to grow quietly in her body. And then a population explosion—so grows the virus. Slowly. Slowly. And then there comes a point of exponential growth and health issues appear.

Of course, when the symptoms begin, she might have many explanations. Maybe its just age related: fatigue, indigestion, headaches. Maybe it's something that will just go away when the sun starts to shine again in the spring. Or maybe if she starts eating better or eliminating certain foods, she'll feel better. Maybe. Maybe not. Then. one day appears a diagnosis of Hep C: Liver damage; research; options—alternative ones first, then the medical route. All begins well. then the body reactions change from the severity of the treatment: Energy—gone; ability to think-erratic; everyday life responsibilities—impossible to do; walking to the store for groceries—too far; pets that need care—too much. Oh dear: Food made her sick; death even entered the room; emergency trips to the hospital; paper work for Advanced Directives completed. Whew. Just a few more treatments. "I can do it..." Then, "No. Done. My body can't do this anymore. The treatments aren't working for me. They worked for my friends but not for me. Enough," she said.

Over the next few weeks, energy returns. Strength returns. Time to enjoy life and family and nature returns. Our friend is back into her living again. The Hep C virus, still in her body, has been reduced by the treat-

It's a big thing to have a friend say she ments. Well-being returned. For that, she is profoundly grateful.

Could I have Hep C? Could you? Our ing enough about Hep C. The story, both friend found out soon enough. Soon enough to know that not enough is known about Hep C. Not enough of what is known for prevention is talked about or provided routinely by our health care providers. Even if you never once used IV or intranasal drugs, be sure to ask that your next blood test includes a test for Hep C. Especially ask if you've had anything related to blood done to your body: A blood transfusion, a blood product, a tattoo... the list goes on.

We learned a lot from our friend. We've came from you and from me, and we find learned about gathering information and making huge changes in lifestyle in service of caring for our one precious body. We learned about staying focused on the things that were most important while the brain is fogged with chemo. We learned about stamina, determination, a strong will, and a heart filled with kindness and appreciation in the midst of difficult treatments. We learned that the treatments could reduce the virus, but not rid our friend of Hep C. We see her life return to thriving under her extra care and the love of family and friends.

ARE YOU TAKING YOUR **VITAMIN B12?**

You may improve your treatment response by also receiving vitamin B12, thus boosting your body's ability to fight the virus.

In this small Italian study, treatment-naïve patients receiving vitamin B12 along with pegIFN/RBV had better SVR rates. Of 94 patients treated, 32 had GT 1. 5000 micrograms of vitamin B12 was injected once every 4 weeks, with no side-effects. The treatment did not include the new directacting antivirals. A larger study is planned, to confirm the results.

[From one of our informed readers: "Me? I am going to take vitamin D, coffee and B12 next time I get treated. I figure I might have at least an extra 5-10% chance of SVR from coffee, and at least the same for Vitamin D and B12. Maybe that works out to a 15 to 30% added chance of SVR on top of whatever the standard or new treatment can offer

me."]

INCIVEK NOW FUNDED IN BC

Incivek, Vertex's first protease inhibitor, is now officially funded by the BC government and federally by NIHB (Non-Insured Health Benefits). ROBOTIC TRANSPLANT

History was made on March 2012 in Sicily. The very first liver transplant was performed where part of the live donor's liver was removed only by remotelycontrolled robotic arms. The donor-the brother of the recipient—received 5 small incisions plus a larger 9 cm. incision (less than 4 inches). The announcement was made in June, after the brothers were declared healthy. There have been other operations using robots in the US, but the surgeon used his hand inside the body to help the robot. The surgical team hopes new technologies will encourage more live organ donations.

JANSSEN AND BMS WORK TOGETHER

Medivir AB and Janssen will collaborate in a Phase II clinical trial combining TMC435 (protease inhibitor) with Bristol-Myers Squibb's daclatasvir (NS5A inhibitor) in about 180 treatment-naïve or nullresponder GT 1a and 1b patients. There will be 4 arms, with or without Ribavirin (RBV), for 12 or 24 weeks. Each drug alone is in Phase III trials. IFN will not be used. Up to 35% of subjects will have fibrosis stage 3-4. GT 1a patients will all receive RBV.

NANOZYMES: THE NEXT STEP?

Scientists in Florida report that an artificial nanoparticle compound can substitute for a silencing mechanism of the body's gene regulatory system called RISC (RNA-induced silencing complex), which causes certain RNA cleavage (split). They have developed a nanozyme for the Hep C virus that can attack its genetic material in a specific way, is hardy, and can be absorbed by liver cancer cells. It hasn't appeared to be toxic to liver cells in cultures or to a mouse bred for Hep C studies, and has been shown to be an effective antiviral in both (more than 99% decrease in viral load), even though it doesn't trigger an IFN response. The researchers hope this discovery will be useful in treating viral infections and cancers.

SAFER ARTHRITIS RELIEF

Try easing arthritis pain without resorting to medication...but check with your doctor first to see if you can use heat or cold therapy. It won't hurt your liver. It's not addictive or invasive. Heat therapy relaxes. It brings blood to the area, along with oxygen, sweeping away cellular waste. It can release muscle spasms and increase range of motion. You can use hot packs, heating pads, gel packs or a hot bath. Don't use heat on a red, hot or irritated joint, though!

Try cold therapy to stop inflammation, ease pain and muscle spasms. Use cold packs, a cold bath, ice cubes, or a bag of frozen peas. If your joint is hot and swollen, the cold compress can relieve the inflammation. Don't use it on a cold, stiff joint. Put a towel between your skin and the hot or cold pack, and only for 20 minutes, maximum.

If your doctor approves, try an easy water exercise program or chair yoga.

Vertex's IncivekCare Patient Assistance Program supports patients with the reimbursement process for Incivek (telaprevir) treatment (Incivek, pegIFN, ribavirin). It will give you an efficient assessment of your options and eligibility. You may qualify to receive co-payment and other financial assistance to supplement your private and provincial drug program coverage. PEGCARE

PegCARE is a reimbursement program to help people who have been prescribed Pegetron and need assistance with any copayment they might have, whether through their provincial coverage (i.e., Pharmacare) deductible or their 3rd-party health insurance. It is pro-rated, so the less the family income is, the more help they get. If someone's net family income is less than \$30,000, they will get 100% reimbursement. The income maximum is \$100,000. Patients must be signed up for Fair Pharmacare to qualify, and they need to provide a copy of last year's T4 form.

A 24/7 Nursing Hotline and bilingual assistance is available, at no charge. Other services are access to live translation services (150 languages) and injection assistance from registered nurses. Ask your doctor or nurse to enroll you in PegCARE. It's an easy single-page form to fill out, which they will provide. PegCARE: 1-866-872-5773

PEGASSIST

The PegAssist Reimbursement Assistance Program provides reimbursement coordination assistance for patients who have been prescribed Pegasys or Pegasys RBV. The program will assist in securing funding for patients to ensure that they can start, stay on, and complete their treatment successfully. PegAssist Reimbursement Specialists are available (Monday to Friday, 10 AM - 6 PM EST) by calling: 1-877-PEGASYS or 1-877 -734-2797. Patients can also obtain a program enrollment form from their nurse/ physician to gain access to the program.

The program provides financial aid to qualified patients, alleviating financial barriers which may prevent patients from starting RCMP Blood Probe Task Force TIPS Hotline treatment, i.e., deductibles and/or copayments. In partnership with CALEA Pharmacy, the program can conveniently deliver the medication directly to patients' homes or to the clinics.

NEUPOGEN VICTORY PROGRAM

Amgen has a program for patients who have been prescribed Neupogen. A reimbursement assessment is conducted by a specialist who will help you navigate through your personal or provincial coverage options. Dependant on specific criteria, some patients may be able to obtain Neupogen on a compassionate basis free of charge. Please note that Amgen will only provide Neupogen to patients on a compassionate basis as long as it is prescribed and dosed in accordance with the approved product monograph.
